COME, GET FAMILIAR WITH THE MARSH and its sighting spots so you can do some birding on your own time. On Saturday, March 27, 8:00 a.m. to noon, the Greater Mohican Audubon Society will have help with binoculars and scopes set up at four observation areas located on this map, including the Bald Eagle Observation Area. The Wilderness Center will have a Dip-Net station set up at the bottom of the hill on Cemetery Road. Carrie Elvey will help you find some small creatures that lurk in the marsh.

 - Funk Bottoms, 18 minutes
 - Whispering Hills RV Park Family Camping, 7 minutes
